# Live the good life, French style

HEN Roger Vadim descended on the Côte d'Azur in the late 50s to direct Brigitte Bardot in a film that thrust her into the public spotlight, it changed her life forever and transformed what had been a sleepy row of villages into an international platform and party hot spot for the rich and fa-

Visitors in search of the good life still flock there, but the more discerning tourist in love with the real face of France, heads to an island off the west coast, which not only matches the Riviera for sun, but outclasses it in just about everything else in terms of joie de vivre, charm and laid-back phistication, to such an extent, it's hard to leave behind.

The Île de Ré is something of a jewel, shimmering with translu-cent light that dazzles and capti-French tourists adore it. vates. French tourists adore it, Americans liken it to the Hamp-tons and visitors from the UK can't get enough of it – if you're English that is.

We've been slow off the mark north of the border but that has gradually changed since Jet2.com's direct flights started operating last year from Edin-burgh to La Rochelle and as more of us discover, this idyllic spot is nothing short of picture-book per-fect, numbers are bound to grow.

Located in the Poitou-Charentes region and linked to the mainland by a toll bridge, the island is made up of ten villages

to suit young and old alike.
Families with young children looking for a safe haven with a relaxed tempo will love Le Bois Plage - a bucket and spade kind of hideaway with a nostalgic appeal and gentle way of life that immediately locks you in its spell, and has you fantasising about moving there permanently.
Winding, cobbled lanes lead to

tidy little squares dotted with pavement bistros and whitewashed houses, while coastal paths open out unexpectedly to reveal a stretch of blond sand and a razor blue blanket of Atlantic Ocean glistening in the sun.

As stress-free zones go, this is a winner, so if your idea of bliss is relaxing on a sun lounger, doing very little, pack a picnic and make a day of it. There's a beach club with loads of activities to keep the kids occupied and trained staff on hand to give mum and dad a bit of a break or per

haps, if they're up to it, try their hand at sea kayaking or windsurf-ing with a qualified instructor.

It's easy to get around the island and the best and most relax-ing way to do it is by bike. Everything is geared up for two wheels, and you'll find bikes for hire - and that includes trailers for babies and toddlers - just about every-

Locals and visitors make full use of the 60 miles of safe cycle paths that follow routes past vineyards, salt marshes and oyster beds and as the landscape is flat,

cycling on Ré is far from taxing. Life doesn't move quite in the same manana time scale in St Martin, but the stylish capital somehow manages to capture a rhythm of life that almost moves in synch with the flow and ebb of the tide

It's an intoxicating blend of his toric and modern, vibrant and mellow and oozes the kind of class money can't buy.

Narrow streets lined with ter

raced houses shadowed by columns of hollyhocks overlook boutiques selling everything from window screens to handmade jewellery and pottery, while the quayside is home to seafood restaurants and patisseries and the all important market, jampacked with mouth-watering local produce that make us so en with mouth-watering vious of our Gallic amis.

Olivia Mathé promotes this wonderful larder in quite a unique way to her guests at the Hôtel de Toiras, a beautiful pale, weath-ered 17th century stone property

overlooking the harbour.

If you'd like to create a menu specifically tailored to your taste, let the staff know in the morning, giving details of your likes and dislikes and that evening, after the finest ingredients have been sourced, you'll be presented with an exquisite dinner, prepared by an inspired chef, which will be a talking point of your holiday long after vou've returned home.

We had our very own culinary adventure on the last night of our stay in the beautiful walled gar-den tucked into the rear of the building.

Plump roasted langoustines in a creamy broth, were followed by a succulent fillet of John Dory, drizzled with a silky vierge sauce and to finish, sweet roasted apricots and almonds, balanced a delicate macaroon and pistachio ice cream that was truly sensa-

When the hotel opened its doors in 2004, Olivia's criterion was that guests should have a was that guests should have a spellbinding experience and that's exactly what they get. With a career in hospitality, lat-terly at the George V in Paris, this



vibrant young woman was well equipped to create her dream of transforming a disused townhouse into a luxurious haven of rooms and suites.

Her emphasis is on the per-sonal touch and everything is a reflection of her style and grace, and although the interior is furnished with exquisite antiques and soft furnishings, it's not stuffy or os-

Instead, it's an oasis of calm, run by an exceptional team and as a result, is well on the way to being the first hotel in the region to be awarded five star status.

There's nothing in isolation that makes life on the Île de Ré so captivating, the truth is, it's a unique mix of everything you ever wanted but thought you'd never find, and given the chance, would return in a heartbeat.
